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

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Holy Week 2018

During Holy Week, there are several opportunities for you to engage with the stories of Jesus' last week. We invite you to join us.

Lenten Guides: Adults and families, continue to utilize your Lenten Devotional following our theme: FBC263 A Call to Discipleship. Families of young children, don't forget to use your Lenten calendar with your child through the season. Parents of older children and youth, ask your child what they've enjoyed in their Wreck This Lenten Journal book.

Palm Sunday, March 25: At our 10:50 am worship service, our children will process in with the Palms, and our Sanctuary Choir will lead us in the Easter portion of Handel's Messiah. Childcare for 2nd grade and younger will be provided after the processional.

Maundy Thursday, March 29: At 7:00 pm, you are invited to our Tenebrae service. This Service of Shadows marks Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples through the crucifixion. We will share in scripture and song, extinguishing candles in preparation for Good Friday. Childcare is provided.

Community Services: The Community of Frankfort offers a service at Frankfort United Methodist Church each day, Monday—Friday, of Holy Week. Service is at noon with a light lunch to follow. No reservations necessary.

This week as I attended the Tuesday lunch discussion I was privileged to take part in a conversation about how important it is that those who follow Jesus learn to be with others in their suffering. In other words, a call to discipleship is a call to see suffering around us and to be with those in emotional, physical and spiritual pain without rushing past their difficulties and grief. Jesus was a master at this. He came close to people no one else wanted to come close to. This is a challenge in our society that seeks to take the edge off of suffering and move on quickly to the next happy experience



It struck me as I listened to folks discussing this truth that the Season on Lent helps us to spend some time, however awkward or uncomfortable it may be, in the difficult life and suffering of Jesus. We want to rush on to the joy and hope of Easter and yet, paying attention to the difficulties of loving God and others with our whole heart is a necessary part of growing as disciples.

Spring is almost here so I'd like to thank those who have participated in our winter small groups and announce the beginning of a new missions study in March for our children and their families:

A huge thanks to our Psalms study leaders, Erica Galyon and Dwight Lovan! Over 20 folks learned about discipleship and the Psalms for 7 weeks together. Look for new upcoming opportunities for small group studies after Easter.

Many thanks also to Financial Peace University facilitators Jenny Luscher and Jeff Fogg who continue to lead their 9 week group on Sunday evenings at 4:00 pm. A group of 10 people are learning together how to be good stewards of God's gifts as they journey in discipleship.

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom;

and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." Colossians 3:16-17.

These two brief passages of scripture hold some of the reasons I believe so strongly in the music ministry. First, our music must always be based on the word of God and the texts should come from either scripture or as a result of authors dwelling on scripture and writing appropriate texts. As singers and instrumentalists, our offering of music should come from the depths of our souls which have dwelt on God's word. It should be visceral.

Second, our gifts should be offered out of gratitude in our hearts for what God has done and continues to do in our lives and in our world!

Third, it should be done in the name of Christ!

This offering leaves no room for pride or self-aggrandizing. Its intent is for the honor and glory of God. God is worthy of nothing less than our very best offering. I have quoted F. Pratt Green several times in this column over the years but I do so again with this great hymn "When In Our Music God Is Glorified." This is our goal!

When in our music, God is glorified, and adoration leaves no room for pride, it is as though all creation cried Alleluia! How often, making music, we have found a new dimension in the world of sound, as worship moved us to a more profound Alleluia!

So has the church, in liturgy and son, in faith and love, through centuries of wrong, borne witness to the truth in every tongue, Alleluia!

And did not Jesus sing a psalm that night when utmost evil strove against the light? Then let us sing, for whom He won the fight: Alleluia!

Let every instrument be tuned for praise! Let all rejoice who have a voice to raise! And may God give us faith to sing always Alleluia!

Recently, I preached on forgiveness as part of the sermon series around our theme for 2018: **FBC263 A Call to Discipleship**. My sermon was based upon the first words of Jesus on the cross described in Luke's gospel.

"Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34a)

Why is forgiveness such an important part of our faith? Perhaps it is because one of the things we all have in common is that we are sinners.

For this reason, it is impossible to overestimate the importance of forgiveness in healthy relationships. None of us is perfect, which means all of us say and do things that undermine our relationships. Without forgiveness, these relationships will not survive.

What is forgiveness? Let me begin with what it is not.

Forgiveness is not ignoring what someone has done to hurt you and neither is it minimizing the pain you feel from their behavior. This is denial.

Forgiveness is choosing to value the person who has disappointed you more than your right to be angry at their unfaithfulness. Forgiveness says to the person who has offended you, "I can't erase what you have done and the pain you have caused me, but I can choose to embrace the possibility of transcending them and repairing this broken relationship. So, I am committed to restoring this relationship in the midst of the pain I feel. Will you work with me?"

When people and the relationship we have with them become more important to us than harboring feelings of resentment and seeking revenge, then forgiveness can occur. It is not that these negative feelings and desires go away. We feel them every day in the beginning, but we refuse to let them control our response, eliminating all hope for reconciliation.

The process of forgiveness, and it is a process, breaks the vicious cycle of anger, hatred, resentment, hostility and violence so prevalent in society, beginning in our homes. It paves the way for achieving reconciliation and healing broken relationships.

Forgiveness makes starting over and beginning again possible, something we all need to do periodically. When someone who has wronged another sees the sacrifices that person is making on their behalf, knowing they don't deserve it, the potential for changes in their behavior and a new path forward increases dramatically.

This is why the call to follow Jesus is a call to forgive. The power forgiveness unleashes in a marriage, a family, a classroom, a workplace, a church and a neighborhood melts hearts, changes lives, restores relationships and builds healthy communities.

Richard Rohr, an American Franciscan friar and inspirational speaker and author, reminds us in his book, <u>Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps</u>, "God does not love us **IF** we can change. God loves us **SO** we can change."

Love precedes change. Change occurs when someone chooses love over hate.

Will you do this?
