

# **NEW BOOK STUDY VIA ZOOM**



We will begin a Zoom book study on Leslie D. Weather-head's book "The Will of God" on Tuesday, March 31, at noon, facilitated by Richard Summers. This will be a five-week discussion of this very brief classic book written in the midst of World War II.

Zoom is available as a free download on your computer, smartphone, or other device. If you are interested in participating in the book study you will need to:

Dear FBC,

We are doing our best to navigate some difficult waters as the situation with COVID 19 continues to evolve. Every medical expert is advocating social distancing as one of the most important ways to prevent the spread of the virus. It is imperative for me to lean on the counsel of the healthcare experts as decisions are made concerning our 'in-person' gatherings. These decisions are challenging and coming to a conclusion of not meeting is one of the hardest choices a pastor can make. I am consulting our staff and FBC members who are medical person-

nel. These decisions are prayed over and discussed thoroughly. My first concern is your health and safety.

The good news is we can still connect, grow and serve during these trying times. Our tech team, led by Adam

Columbia, is providing us a way to virtually worship together on Sundays. I appreciate their work every Sunday, but our current situation makes their service even more critical. Our Facebook page and website have the information on how to tune in live to our worship experiences and Bible study on Wednesday evenings. I realize this is not ideal, but let's be thankful for this technology and our members who have the skills to manage it.



I realize anxiety and worry abound for many individuals during this chaotic situation. I want to suggest that people of faith are built for troubled times. Frederick Buechner wrote, "Peace is not the absence of struggle, but the presence of love." The presence of God's love in our lives grants us a peace that passes all understanding. We can cast our cares upon God because God cares for us. Peace is having faith that whatever we face on this earth, that God, through Jesus, has overcome all the darkness and despair. In Hebrew, the term for peace – shalom – did not imply that wars have ceased. Instead, shalom, means having everything you need to be whole and happy. God made this kind of peace for us through Christ Jesus. Regardless of what virus is spreading, what war is waging or even what diagnosis may be given, you have everything you need in Jesus.

I believe this is an unprecedented time for connecting, growing and serving. During this season, we can truly see how the church is not a building, but it is people. Church hasn't been cancelled – it can't be. YOU are the church – so go be the church. Find an elderly person or someone with underlying conditions that categorize them in the most vulnerable for this virus and offer to get their groceries, cook them a meal or get their medications for them.

Offer to help children with their homework over the phone, via skype or email since they don't have their teachers



immediately available like they would in their classrooms. Invite people to join us on Sunday morning through our Facebook page for worship. Use this time to grow in your prayer life. Do a Christian book study with someone – read a book together and discuss it over the phone. Think about creative ways in which we can be the church in this unique period.

Our tithes and offerings are critical during this time. We have a way to give securely online through our website. We can also mail our gifts to the church. I understand our current situation will impact individuals uniquely. Some may be worried about employment or other financial strains. If you need to 'catch up' later on your giving, that is totally understandable. For those of us who are able to contribute normally, my prayer is we will remember to do so as our church faces these uncertain times. I've communicated for months now that 2020 will be important on several levels and financially we need to be ready to face our challenges and opportunities. With the joy and excitement of bringing on new Associate Pastors soon, this also accentuates our need to support our FBC budget. My prayer is when the dust settles from this pandemic, we might look back and see our faithfulness in giving. Thank you, in advance, for your gifts to FBC as we seek to advance the Gospel of Jesus Christ.



As we think about upcoming special occasions in the life of the church, namely, Palm Sunday and Easter, we are faced with the likelihood of not being physically together. This saddens me as I know it does you. It is my favorite time of year and I always look forward to seeing the pews filled. I want to encourage you to celebrate the Risen Lord in a new way this year. Even though our 'online' service for this season of pandemic may be unique, I believe we still can rejoice and praise God with all our might because of the Resurrection. I hope you will plan on participating and inviting others to

connect virtually with our church through Facebook live.

I am extremely grateful for Dr. Keith Stillwell and his service to FBC as Interim Associate Pastor of Spiritual Formation. His new job/ministry with 'Together for Hope' is exciting and will be beneficial to many in Appalachia. Of course, he and Dianne are members, so they won't be leaving us and we are grateful for their presence and participation in our family of faith.

You will be updated on a regular basis concerning our activities – the cancellations and when we will resume. Please be understanding as we pursue the best course of action in the weeks to come. Call on me if I can be of any assistance.

### THE BARNABAS GROUP

Acts 11: 23-24: <sup>23</sup> When he (*Barnabas*) arrived and saw what the grace of God had done, he was glad and encouraged them all to remain true to the Lord with all their hearts. <sup>24</sup> He was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith, and a great number of people were brought to the Lord.
